"Who gave himself for our sins, that he might deliver us from this present evil world, according to the will of God and our Father" (Galatians 1:4).

Jesus was despised and rejected of men in order that we might be acceptable to God. "He is despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief: and we hid as it were our faces from him; he was despised, and we esteemed him not" (Isaiah 53:3). "In whom we have redemption through his blood, the for-giveness of sins, according to the riches of his grace" (Ephesians 1:7). "And that he might reconcile both unto God in one body by the cross, having slain the enmity thereby" (Ephesians 2:16). "This is the stone which was set at nought of you builders, which is become the head of the corner. Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:11-12).

## I Gave My Life For Thee

It was in the year 1858 that Frances Ridley Havergal was inspired by a painting in an art gallery in Germany. The painting portrayed Christ on the cross, and over the crown of thoms were the words: "This have I done for thee; What hast thou done for me?"

So impressed was Miss Havergal with the picture and the words that she wrote a few lines of poetry. As she later looked again at her poetry, she was not satisfied with her effort and she threw the paper into the fireplace. But an interesting thing then happened: before the paper could catch on fire a gust of wind from the chimney blew the paper back out on the hearth.

Miss Havergal later showed her father the poetry she had written. He encouraged her to add more verses to complete the poem. This she did, thus making the first of what came to be hundreds of hymns written by this young woman. Because of her visit to an art museum in Dusseldorf, Germany in 1858, we are blessed by the words of this great song.



I gave my life for thee, My precious blood I shed, That thou might'st ransomed be, And quickened from the dead; I gave, I gave my life for thee, What hast thou giv'n for Me?
